Steven Falk, Arborealist to Warwickshire County Council on November 9th 2006

Key: CP – car park areas and top of drive, G – main garden, GI – The Glade, W – Walled Garden, O- Orchard.

Broadleaves

Acer palmatum – Smooth Japanese Maple (GI)
Acer pseudoplatanus – Sycamore (various places)
Aesculus hippocastanum – Horse Chestnut (various places)
Alnus glutinosa – Common Alder (damper areas)
Buxus sempervirens – Box (GI)
Carpinus betulus – Common Hornbeam (GI plus a hedge in CP)
Castanea sativa – Sweet Chestnut (O)
Corylus avellana – Common Hazel (O, some quite old stools)
Fraxinus excelsior – Common Ash (various places)
Ilex aquifolium – Common Holly (various types in various places)
Juglans regia – Common Walnut (O)
Laburnum sp – a laburnum (type not checked)
Malus domestica – Orchard Apple (O)
Morus alba – White Mulberry (O)
Morus nigra – Black Mulberry (W)
Nothofagus obliqua – Roble Beech (top of entrance drive, 1.79m GBH/2006 below low fork)
Populus x Canadensis – Hybrid Black Poplar (near GI)
Prunus avium – Wild Cherry (various places)
Prunus domestica – Plum (O)
Prunus institia – Damson (O)
Pyrus communis – Common Pear (O)
Rhododendron ponticum – rhododendron (various places)
Robinia pseudoacacia 'Frisia' – Golden Robinia (GI)
Quercus palustris – Pin Oak (young one in GI)
Quercus robur – English Oak (various places)
Quercus rubra – Red Oak (young one in GI)
Quercus sp indet – an oak (the strange one of 3.93m NE of the Hall, leaves like a large robur, but shape like Hungarian oak *Q. frainetto* – maybe a hybrid)
Salix alba – White Willow (various places)
Salix babylonica 'Tortuosa' – Corkscrew Willow (G)
Salix cinerea – Grey Willow (damper areas)
Salix viminalis – Osier (damper places)
Sambucus nigra – Elder
Ulmus minor vulgaris – English Elm (regrowth)

Conifers

Araucaria araucana – Monkey Puzzle (GI, 1.82m GBH/2006)
Cedrus deodara – Deodar (GI)
Chamaecyparis lawsoniana – Lawson Cypress (GI)
Platycladus orientalis – Oriental Thuja (two in GI, largest 1.23m @ base/2006)
Pinus nigra – Austrian or Corsican Pine (various places)
Pinus strobus – Weymouth Pine (GI – two young ones)
Pinus sylvestris – Scots Pine (GI)
Sequoiadendron giganteum – Giant Sequoia/Wellingtonia (GI)
Taxus baccata – Common Yew (various places)
